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Bell Shaped

[Sleeves] were usually straight and fitted snug to the wrist and were made of the same material as the dress with little or no embellishment. Not so the sleeves of spring. There is greater variety in shape and length than we’ve had in any recent time.

The three-quarter sleeve ending in a bell shaped “flounce” is shown on afternoon dresses and suits of silk that have little boleros or straight jackets. They are also used as lace dinner dresses with removable jackets.
