

Traffic Signal Finders

These handy little gadgets were quite popular in the early days of automobiles. For the Model A, the design with the visor sticking out over the windshield made seeing the overhead traffic signals difficult to see without scrunching down and twisting your neck. These little reflectors worked similar to our modern side mirrors that say "objects in mirror are closer than they seem". The concave shape makes objects look smaller and closer. It also shows a wider angle view, like a fish eye lens. All in all, they seemed to work quite well as they remained popular throughout the 50's.





Check out your dad's garage, or grandpa's barn, or maybe even tag along to the next swap meet to find an old radiator shell.




This one has a mirror on the back and glass shelves, but I bet it would look just as awesome using other materials as well.






