

THE MODEL A YEAR IN REVIEW.....

2023 was a busy year for the White Mountain Region Chapter. We had twenty (20) Events during the year with an average turnout of around fifteen members and six or more Model A Fords attending. It is always fun to look back on the season to see what the club was up to. So, let's take a look......

The Model A Dust Off at the Bean Farm in Sanbornville, NH was our first road trip of the season. This has been an annual event thanks to Carl Sneirson who has been organizing this event for a number of years. This year the event was on April 29th with eighteen members and nine Model A's from our club. Gathering at the Spaulding High School in Rochester, we joined the large group of Model A's for the drive to Sanbornville to the Bean Farm, home of Randy & Connie Kinville. Six other car clubs were invited to attend. It has always been Carl's goal to have 100 Model A Fords at this event and this year there were 101. The Memorial Day Parade in Hopkinton, NH took place on May 29th. Following the parade and a ceremony at the Harold Martin School in Hopkinton, our group of eighteen members and eleven Model A's gathered at the home of Ben Cochran and Edie Currier in Contookcook. We all lined up for a photo shoot. Ben & Edie brought out Ben's Mom's collection of Vintage Hats for the ladies to try on. Everyone enjoyed their picnic lunch and for dessert Ben & Edie provided ice cream. Speaking of ice cream, our next ice Cream social took place on May 31st at Lang's in Pembroke, NH. Eleven members gathered there in their Model A's that numbered six.

June was a slow month for the club. With graduations and Father's Day celebrations, people were a little busy. We did have a Jam Session at the home of Bob Bergevin in Candia on the 21st of June which brought in ten members and one Model A Ford. That Model A belonged to George & Beryl Miville. An ice cream social in June at Ilsleys' in Weare was also planned at the end of June. It was a beautiful summer evening, however, only four members and two Model A's were in attendance. Seems that people were having a very busy June this year.

July 4th was upon us before we knew it. Time to celebrate our Country's Birthday with our usual 4th of July Parade and Cookout! This year the parade was in New Boston and the Cookout was at the home of Dick & Susan Smith in Bow, NH. As you may know, our club had been dodging rain drops all season and as it turned out, our day was hampered by threat of showers and then a down right New England downpour. The parade went off without a hitch but when everyone gathered for the Cookout, we had to move inside. Of course, it didn't ruin the day at all as everyone gathered up the food and brought it all inside for all to enjoy. Thank you to Dick & Susan for hosting as we all had a wonderful day.

An Ice Cream Social took place on the 12th of July at Arnie's in Concord. A good turnout with eleven members and five Model A's. Again, the threat of rain was looming but we were able to stay dry for the evening's event. July 22nd was the Annual Old Ford Day at the Ice House Museum in New London, NH. This is always well attended and this year was no exception. With twenty-six members and twenty-three Model A's we had a wonderful day. No rain! Ben Cochran did a super job organizing this event for the folks at the Ice House. Ben had a number of Model A games for the group to participate along with the annual "balancing act" on the balancing beam. Fred Brunneholzl came the closest to balancing his 1928 Roadster Pickup. Other game winners were: Mike Barwell with the loudest Ah-oo-gah horn; Vin Greco

with the oil level closest to full without the engine running; and Paul and Julia Haynes, with their son Charlie, who traveled to the event from Worcester Vermont, were awarded the prize for traveling the most miles to attend.

August was upon us and we started the month with an Ice Cream Social at Richardson's in Boscawen on the 2nd of August. This event brought in twenty members and ten Model A's. There is always a large group at this Social which we figured must be the home made ice cream but I believe the location has a lot to do with the large turn out. Located on a country road in Farm Country in Boscawen, it is a lovely spot to spend a summer evening.

On August 19th the club made the trip over to Milton, NH to the Truck & Tractor Show at the Farm Museum. This tour was organized by Steve & Tricia Rosen. The group toured the historic Farmhouse & Tavern built in 1810 as well as the barn with antique machinery and tools on display. Also on display in the barn was the longest sled in the world, named "Uncle Sam", which was the perfect spot for a photo shoot of all the members. We also posed for a photo shoot outside with our Model A Fords. Frank Kennedy from the Maine Pine Tree Model A Ford Club was in attendance that day with his daughter Meg. They are both avid photographers and were gracious enough to take these photos of our group.

Farm Days at Musterfield Farm in Sutton, NH took place on August 27th. Our group numbered thirteen members and seven Model A Fords. We had a super day touring the Vintage Farm with all the Agricultural Exhibits and enjoyed our picnic lunch while relaxing in the shade.

The Annual Bean Hole Event took place on September 10th. However, the event was interrupted by rain showers off and on. The attendance from our club, as well as other car clubs, was down significantly due to the weather. We did manage to have seven members and three Model A's show up. The beans? Oh yes! They were cooked and ready at noon!

Rain canceled the Ice Cream social for the 13th which was at Devriendt Farm in Goffstown. However, four members did attend (in their modern cars).

Another Music Jam Session at Bob Bergevin's home in Candia took place on the 20th which was a rather cool September evening. Six members and one Model A Ford attended and the music was excellent. Everyone was well prepared for the cool weather and we had a great time.

On September 24th the club attended the Annual BBQ and Hubley Race at the Idletime Farm in Hopkinton, NH. This event is hosted each year by the Smith and Westover Family. The BBQ Chicken is always excellent and the members bring side dishes to share. Model A games followed the feast with the "Slow Race" which is always entertaining. This year the race was a photo finish and the winner was Dick Sperry in his 1930 Tudor. Feed the Animals was next on the list of games.
