cheered up. That was a step up from any old homemade tractor, after all!


So this year the firewood was moved by very willing and able teenagers, and Dad Sitzman had a few more days to spend getting the rest of his list done before the weather turned cold.

#### The Mishawaka High School Model A Restoration Team

The Mishawaka Indiana high school has a Model A Restoration team! Did you know? I didn't! I found out when they brought part of their ongoing project to National Model A Day at the Gilmore. Their interactive chassis display was a huge hit!

The project started a way's back when teacher Paul Modlin proposed the class and the Mishawaka Education Foundation (MEF), a local group that supports teachers and students, came through with a grant to kickstart the project. The project was embarked upon last year, when a suitable Model A Tudor was finally located. The first year saw it stripped down and the chassis being rebuilt. The challenges of COVID-19 definitely slowed the progress down. This year, there is a new group of students who will continue the work. There will also be a new teacher, as Paul Modlin retired in May. But no worries, he handed off the project to his nephew Ben Modlin, also a teacher at the school!

During Model A Day, the entire restoration team was honored by MAFCA, MAFFI, and MARC for their continuing work on the restoration. All three groups presented the students with restoration material for their car and memberships into their organizations. The students were even honored with a formal introduction to Wayne Carini, the host of Chasing Classic Cars.

Krya Alexander, student manager for the team, gave a short talk at the annual MAFFI meeting, explaining her group's mission, and reflecting the passion all the students feel regarding this project. She invited everyone to visit their booth and examine their progress to date! I think a lot of people took her up on that offer!





The ultimate goal is to have the 1931 Model-A Tudor restored to factory condition by the end of the school year, and then to auction it off . The proceeds will then continue to help fund the Mishawaka Engineering program. The hope is that it will also bring public awareness to MEF. The final results should also demonstrate all the amazing skills this restoration project has taught the talented students that have been a part of this unique and rewarding project!

Just over three years ago when Luke was 17, he and his father starting restoring a 1929 Pickup Truck that has been in his family since it was

Luke said that he learned many things while doing the restoration including how the engine is wired, and how the cooling system and transmission work. His father was a great support for Luke along the way.




### The Model A Battery

A battery is a device that stores chemical energy and converts it to electrical energy. Without a battery, you would be out front hand-cranking the motor to get your Model A started!

While today's cars still use batteries, they are usually installed and then not thought of again until they stop starting the vehicle! Not so with the original Model A equipment. Per the instructions in the manual that came with a new Model A, the water level and electrolyte solution in the battery needed to be checked every two weeks. If the water was allowed to evaporate below the top of the plates the life of the battery would be seriously affected. It was also important to keep the battery filling plugs and connections tight, and the top of the battery clean! And, oh yes, you had to make sure to keep the battery firmly secured in it's mounting bracket, to prevent damage. So, where to start?


Well, all of the Model A batteries were mounted under the driver's side floorboard. To do the checks, you had to lift a small access plate under the driver's feet. But to replace a battery, you have to take out the floor boards. Ok, good to know!

Other things good to know are that the original Model A battery was a 6 volt, 80 amp hour, 13 plates, positive ground. Today, some owners have converted to a 12 volt system, to more easily handle modern tech needs.




Electrical energy in a battery is generated by a chemical reaction between metal and an acid liquid. In the case of a lead-acid battery such as a Model A uses, a mixture of sulfuric acid and water, known as electrolyte, reacts with metal plates inside the battery.

These plates are in a series of cells. Each cell is made of a set of lead plates and lead dioxide plates which are covered in an electrolyte solution.



This causes a reaction with the plates that generates electrons that flow out the terminals as electricity!

A six-volt battery has three single cells, a 12 volt battery has 6 cells. The process does eventually wear out, which is why a battery needs to be replace periodically.


