

It's been in the family since the early 2000s when her grandpa got it. In 2021, when Sydney's family moved to California, he gave it to them knowing it would be able to be used more in the California climate than it would in Wisconsin.

At first, Sydney just loved going for rides. A favorite memory is when they were driving at the mall. She says they didn't stop, but they were showing off, and if someone waved, they would ring the bell or give a thumbs up!

Sydney says she loves sticking her hand out the window and letting the air run through her hand and smelling the air. She says she feels "free" doing this. One of her favorite tours was a ride through Bouquet Cannons in southern California. When asked why she loves the Model A, Sydney just says she loves everything about it, but especially the color, and the big back seat where she can take a nap!

Shortly after bringing the Model A home, Sydney's dad James caught her sneaking outside to clean out the car, just to be able to be in and around it. So, he decided to see how she would do actually working on it by having her help with an oil change. Sydney took to it like a pro. 


Work on the new 1909 Sears Model.

## Two-Tooth Steering Basics

Have you ever wondered how the steering works on your Model A? When you turn the steering wheel, what transfers that movement to the tires? Well, an essential step in that process is the steering assembly.


Ford used two different designs on the Model A, but the most common was the "Two-Tooth" assembly as pictured below. There are a lot of parts involved, but for this article, let's focus on the steering worm gear and the two-tooth sector shaft. When you turn the wheel, the worm gear turns. That causes the two-tooth sector shaft, interlocking at a 90 degree angle to the gear, to turn in the desired direction. That movement is transferred to the pitman arm, which finishes the job of changing the motion into the direction required to turn the wheels. There are a number of adjustments that can be done to help the steering be smoother, but that's another article for another time!




## **Ford Advertising**

See the slipper slide and umbrellas on the far side of the car? It appears to be either a lake or seashore playground.


The young boy and girl are being escorted to the car by what is most likely a nanny or maid, from the look of her white outfit. So Ford is implying that this car is quite acceptable for the well-to-do.

An interesting thing about this ad is that it not only promotes the safety glass in the windshield, but promises that for just a "slight additional cost" you can have safety glass in all the windows and doors. Certainly a attractive option for a family oriented person. Who wouldn't want to make their family just a little safer!?






Answers to Six Different Things
